








The Public Information and Awareness Services for Vulnerable Communities in Lao PDR Project (PIASVC) at Tha Village in Kham District, Xiengkhouang province

Overview of Project Outcome

Through the PIASVC project, CASE team has been providing training session for villagers in 10 target villages in Kham district to help increase people's understanding of the land law, and to build their capacity, in particular for village volunteer groups and village mediation units, with the knowledge to resolve conflicts within their communities. Here is the perspective of the project's beneficiaries:



"In my personal opinion, implementing this project in the target area has the potential to significantly improve the lives of residents. Specifically, fostering awareness of land, forest and natural resource laws can lead to a reduction in both internal and external conflicts. This includes issues like deforestation for farming, which can create problems like pollution and resource scarcity, ultimately hindering livelihoods. Ideally, the project would also promote changes that recognize equal land use rights for all, including a focus on the importance of gender equality in land management."



"This project has helped and benefited us greatly, especially in helping us understand land use for all types, including traditional uses. I myself can now share the knowledge I've gained with other villagers so we can all have a clearer understanding together. Looking ahead, if possible, we would love for the project to help us navigate the process of obtaining land title documents.
